## Managing Asthma Better

Asthma is a common disease affecting more than 2.2 million Australians.

Approximately 1 in every 6 children, 1 in 7 adolescents and 1 in 9 adults in Australia currently have asthma.

This could mean that the lifestyle of up to 900 children and 600 adults in Dalyellup, Stratham and Gelorup may be affected by asthma.

We offer asthma education clinics for people living with asthma. The appointment includes an education session with **Lucy**, one of our Registered Nurses.



An asthma education session involves assessing the severity of asthma, lung function testing if appropriate, developing an asthma action plan, understanding signs, symptoms and triggers of asthma, correct use of medications and spacers and asthma first aid.

### **HEALTHY KIDS CHECK**

If your child has had their third birthday and has not yet turned five, you may wish to book them in for a *Healthy Kids Check.* 

A *Healthy Kids Check* is available to all children at, or around, the time of their 4 year old immunisation, which can now be given from  $3 \frac{1}{2}$  years old, to help ensure that children are healthy, fit and ready to learn when they start school.

A *Healthy Kids Check* will include an assessment of your child's height and weight, their eyesight, hearing and oral health, allergies and discussion about their toilet habits.

#### What does your score mean?

Score	Risk	What you should do
9+	High	If you haven't had a skin check in the last 12 months have one as soon as possible. Scan your skin every 3 months.
4-8	Medium	Start with a skin check by your doctor. Scan your skin at least twice a year. See your doctor at least every 2-3 years.
0-4	Low	Scan your skin at least once per year. See a doctor for a one off skin check . Remember: Low risk doesn't mean no risk.

# A treatment for superficial skin

Diathermy and curettage is a really useful treatment for some skin cancers and is used at Dalyellup Skin Care Clinic.

It removes superficial skin cancers which do not have aggressive features. The procedure is less invasive and has less risk than excising (cutting out) a skin cancer.

Curettage and diathermy is particularly useful when someone has multiple skin cancers on their torso and arms.

A small instrument is used to scrape out the cancerous tissue within the skin, which is followed by electrical diathermy. A deep graze is left and a small dressing is applied. The wound takes two to three weeks to heal, leaving a pink scar which fades to a pale colour over several months. In correctly trained hands the cure rate is around 97%.

More aggressive skin cancers need to be excised.
