## THINKING OF TRAVELLING OVERSEAS?

The health of yourself and your family is an important consideration when planning your trip. Here are a few tips.



**Influenza** is the most common, **vaccine preventable** disease acquired by travellers (1).

**Typhoid and Hepatitis A** are two preventable diseases which can be acquired by ingesting contaminated water or food. Travellers to Bali including children over the age of 2 should consider being vaccinated against these infections.

Having a plan before leaving to prevent and manage traveller's diarrhoea is important. The most important part of treatment is fluid rehydration. Taking electrolyte replacement satchets such as Gastrolyte is worthwhile to assist with rehydration. Small amounts of fluid frequently is recommended.

**Dalyellup Family Medical Centre** is accredited to vaccinate against **Yellow Fever** which is required vaccine in travelling to yellow fever endemic zones in Africa and Central and South America. This vaccine covers for ten years.

Rabies has been diagnosed in dogs in Bali. Rabies is mainly a disease of animals and can be spread to humans from a bite or scratch from an infected animal. In Bali avoid contact with dogs, cats, monkeys. If bitten by any animal wash the wound well with soap and water and seek medical attention as soon as possible. Post exposure treatment is likely to be started. **Travel insurance** is a must as it enables the ability to be flown back home at short notice for medical care if required.

**Travel advice consultations** generally take 15-30 minutes so please inform the reception staff if the consultation is regarding travel advice. All family members travelling need to attend at the initial appointment.

## WHAT DOES THE FEDERAL BUDGET MEAN FOR MY DOCTOR VISITS?

On the 13th May 2014 the Government announced its 2014-2015 Budget. Some of the proposed changes related to medical appointments.

The first thing to mention is that **all of the measures are subject to the passage of the legislation**. They may not happen or they may change significantly. The main one that concerns patients is the contribution towards the cost of health care. If this is implemented it would begin on 1st July 2015.

When you see a doctor, or have a pathology test or diagnostic imaging, you may be asked to pay a \$7 contribution. If you hold a pensioners concession card, a Commonwealth Seniors card or a Health Care card, you may be charged up to 10 patient contributions in a calendar year. Alternatively, if your doctor doesn't bulk bill you and charges you for the visit you will receive \$5 less from Medicare.

We will all have to wait and see how this eventuates.

#### FOUR YEAR OLD HEALTH CHECKUPS

Since September 2013 a trained nurse (employed by South West Medicare Local) has, in collaboration with a GP, provided a four year old **Healthy Kid's Check** at the surgery. The aim of the **Healthy Kid's Check** is to detect problems early that may affect your child's schooling and lifestyle, including delayed development or illness. A **Healthy Kid's Check** will include an assessment of your child's height, weight, eyesight and hearing. Ring the surgery on 9795 6422 for dates and times when the nurse is available.

#### **IDENTIFYING SKIN CANCERS**

Here are a few clues to identify spots that may be cancerous. To positively identify a skin cancer a Dermatoscope should be used. The doctors at the Dalyellup Skin Cancer Clinic are trained in the use of a Dermatoscope. To find out more about a Dermatoscope you could visit our website.

#### **NEW OR CHANGING SPOT**



If a spot is a new spot or has changed (if you are over 40 years old).

#### **BLEEDING SPOT**



If a spot shows signs of bleeding.

#### **LONELY SPOT**



A spot that is on its own, appearing different to the others.

#### **SORE TO TOUCH**



If a spot is painful to touch (often a stinging pain) when gently squeezed it may be cancerous.
